WO: Schoolhouse Fire fatality learning review report released

The Forest Service released a <u>learning review</u> report concerning the death of Token Adams, a 41year-old engine captain with the Jemez Ranger District on the Santa Fe National Forest. Adams died Aug. 30, 2012, from injuries sustained in an ATV accident. The intent of the report is to improve safety and performance across the Forest Service.

R1: Bitterroot National Forest employee named IOGA's Resource Manager of the Year

Marty Almquist, Bitterroot National Forest's outfitter permit administrator, received the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Association's Resource Manager of the Year Award at their annual meeting. The award, handed out since 1988, recognizes a state or federal agency resource manager who enhances communication, understanding and cooperation with individual outfitters and the Idaho outfitting and guiding industry.

The awards recognize exceptional and outstanding individual and team accomplishments that are relative to the goals and objectives of CALFIRE.

PNWRS: Station scientists receive national honors

The PNW Research Station is proud to announce that four of its own have received national Forest Service honors. Research plant pathologist Paul Hennon and research ecologist Dede Olson each received a 2013 Research and Development Deputy Chief's Award for distinguished science and science delivery, respectively. Research biologist David L. Peterson and Western Wildland Environmental Threat Assessment Center Director Nancy Grulke received 2013 Chief's Awards for excellence in the science and technology and sustaining forests and grasslands categories, respectively.

RMRS: Station data now part of the Forest Service Research Data Archive

The Rocky Mountain Research Station has provided archived digital research data to the public and science community since 2005. In 2010, the FS created the <u>Forest Service Research Data</u> <u>Archive</u>, housing data for Research and Development (R&D) and affiliated programs. In 2013, the RMRS Data Archive completed integration into the FS-RDA. FS-RDA assigns Digital Object Identifier names (<u>DOI</u>) to each data product within the Archive – allowing data users to find cited data sets using a permanent URL. Data authors can track citations of their products across the scientific literature. FS-RDA supports an extended search capability, allowing users to find data using keywords, author, location, funding agency, etc.

Soil scientist Receives five-month research fellowship

Soil Scientist Dan Neary recently received a research fellowship award from the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), an internationally recognized economic organization of 34 countries formed to stimulate economic progress and world trade. Neary's research project, titled *Maintaining Water Quality under Sustainable Intensification of Plantation Forestry in New Zealand*, addresses OECD Theme I: The Natural Resources Challenge, including innovative approaches to assessing the environmental vulnerability of

management practices involving renewable resources. His five-month fellowship begins October 2014, at the New Zealand Forest Research Institute in Rotorua, New Zealand.

SRS: The emerging chromosomes of the American and Chinese chestnuts

Nurul Faridi, Southern Research Station research geneticist, and his colleagues at the Forest Genetics and Ecosystems Biology unit are working with Penn State University, Clemson University, and The American Chestnut Foundation to map and characterize the American chestnut genome. The team plans to integrate the DNA sequence of both American and Chinese chestnut to a physical map of their chromosomes that will help accelerate breeding efforts and ultimately help to return the American chestnut tree to our forests.
